The ACP fellowship represents the multi-disciplinary nature of phlebology and includes a variety of medical specialties such as vascular surgery, dermatology, interventional radiology, haematology, vascular medicine and lymphology. LOCATION

FIJI

Fiji's cluster of heavenly islands is located in the middle of the South Pacific. Scattered across 1,290,000 square kilometres of ocean, it's a tropical paradise of palm-fringed white sand beaches and lush rainforests fringed by thriving coral reefs and fish-filled lagoons.

Roughly one third of the 333 islands are inhabited. Most people live in the urban areas of the two larger islands – Viti Levu & Vanua Levu.

Time Zone

Straddling the 180th Meridian, Fiji is exactly 12 hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT). Daylight savings kicks in around November to January, when Fiji moves one more hour ahead.

Climate

There are two seasons here - warm and even warmer! It's a sunny, tropical climate that'll wash the winter chills from your bones.

From December to April, the temperatures are a comfortable 22° - 33°C. But expect May to November to be slightly cooler with temperatures ranging from 19°- 29°C.

People & Language

Fiji's population of more than 880,000 is a melting pot of indigenous Fijians (i-Taukei), Indo-Fijians, Chinese, Part-Europeans and other South Pacific Islanders who call Fiji home. Despite their varied cultural backgrounds, locals are collectively referred to as Fijians.

English is Fiji's official language but you'll often find that most people are bilingual - speaking Fijian or Hindustani as well.

Outside hotels and resorts, people dress modestly - even more so when visiting a Fijian village. It's best to visit one with a tour guide as there are many traditional protocols to be observed.

Key words you will hear and use in Fiji include:

Bula - Is used to greet people or to say hello.

Vinaka - Thank you

Vinaka vakalevu - Thank you very much

Kerekere - Please

Io - Yes [E-ooh]

Sega - No [Se-nga]

Electricity

The local electric current is 240 volts AC 50Hz. Fiji's three-pin power outlets are identical to Australia and New Zealand. Most leading hotels and resorts have universal outlets for 240v or 110v shavers, hair dryers and other electrical appliances.

Tipping

Tipping is not expected but feel free to reward someone for outstanding service.

GETTING AROUND FIJI

BY ROAD

Paved highways encircle the two big islands connecting villages, towns and cities so it's fairly easy to get around.

Hotel and Private Transfers

Most hotels can arrange airport transfers. Some are complimentary while others charge a small fee. Alternatively, you can take the stress out of 'getting there' and pre-book your transfers through local companies.

Bula Bus

The Bula Bus is the only transport you will need to get around Denarau Island between the Port, Hotels, Waterpark and Golf Course. It is a unique open air hop-on hop-off bus service. The cost is \$11 FJD per adult per day or \$35 FJD for a Five Day Pass. Children under 12 travel free with a valid ticket holder.

Taxis

They're an easy option for short trips to Nadi, Denarau and Lautoka. If you flag a taxi off the street, look out for the LT or LH registrations on the license plate. LT plates are metered taxis with a base rate of FJ\$2.50. LH taxis are not metered and have fixed distance rates. Check with your hotel reception about general distances and taxi costs and confirm these with your taxi driver before starting your trip. Before you catch a taxi in Fiji, make sure you have cash (Fiji dollars) for payments and that their taxi metre is turned on.

Car Rentals

Pre-book your rental online with any of the companies at Nadi International Airport. They're located just outside the International Arrivals terminal. All you'll need is a valid driver's license (in English) and a credit card. In Fiji, cars are right hand drives on the left side of the road.

BY AIR

Flying is by far the fastest and easiest way to travel off Viti Levu. Stunning birds-eye views of the islands are just an added bonus! Fiji Link and Northern Air – Fiji's domestic airlines - fly to most small airports around the country. Several companies run charter flights out of Nadi Airport, ready to whisk you away on a scenic helicopter, seaplane or small aircraft.

BY SEA

The most affordable and popular way to see the islands.

Passenger (Resort) Ferries

Escape to the stunning Mamanuca and Yasawa islands with daily connections out of Port Denarau. South Sea Cruises operates these sectors.

Local (Roll on-off Ferries)

If you are cost-conscious, there's always the inter-island ferry to consider. Locals favour this no-frills option for cheap travel between Viti Levu and Vanua Levu. It's also great for self-drives as you're able to take your car onboard with you.

Water Taxis

The Mamanuca and Yasawa islands are some of the most accessible islands in Fiji. If you've missed the regular boat, share a water taxi or charter your own to your resort. Most depart Port Denarau Marina.

THINGS TO DO IN FIJI



GO CRUISING

Get beyond Viti's Levu's sprawling shores and sample the charms of far-flung Fiji on an ocean-going adventure. With 333 islands to explore, there's no better way to visit Fiji's wild places. Hop aboard a sailing ship or catamaran to exotic locales where you can play castaway on a deserted beach, snorkel off an exquisite sand cay or toast the setting sun on a sail around the harbour.



GARDEN OF THE SLEEPING GIANT

This must-see spot is an absolute botanic bonanza. Abloom with more than 2000 varieties of orchids, plus indigenous flora and other tropical beauties, the 20-hectare plantation makes for a gorgeous getaway. Tours are included in the entrance fee, or go on a solo meander along the jungle boardwalk.



SABETO MUD POOL AND HOT SPRINGS

Head to Sabeto for a soothing soak in the area's mud and geothermal pools. The fun, natural spa treatment kicks off with a thick mud lather before washing it all off with a dip in the different thermal pools. You'll feel like a million dollars after – especially if you top if off with a massage from one of the locals.



SRI SIVA SUBRAMANIYA SWAMI TEMPLE

This bright Hindu temple is one of the few places outside India where you can see traditional Dravidian architecture; the wooden carvings of deities travelled here from India, as did the artists who dressed the temple in its colourful coat and impressive ceiling frescos. The inner sanctum is reserved for devotees bringing offerings.



GO ZIPLINING

Check out either of Nadi's two zipline courses for some thrilling treetop adventures. The Sleeping Giant Zip (Sabeto) may have only 5 ziplines but their adventure park packages offer unlimited zips and waterfall tours with lunch. Zip Fiji's (Momi) 16 ziplines entice thrill seekers with longer and higher zips.



EXPLORE THE SIGATOKA RIVER

There are numerous ways to explore the Sigatoka River, whether it be river tubing, rafting, canoeing or taking a high adrenaline jet boat, there is a way to explore for those who want to take it easy and those who want a thrill!




