A Delegate's Perspective

ACP2022 was held at the Crowne Plaza in Coogee, NSW. After a hiatus of two years from face-to-face conferences, the annual scientific meeting was back in hybrid fashion, with both face-to-face and virtual platforms. It was finally a chance to reconnect with colleagues after a tough few years.

The opening plenaries were a great way to kick off proceedings with updates on CVD guidelines and classifications. It is always a pleasure to listen to Prof. Andre Van Rij speak. Prof. Fred Joshua's talks around other medical conditions and their implications for phlebology had everyone thinking outside the box.
